Morrisville Implements Language Access Plan

In Morrisville, the saying is we don't talk about language barriers, instead we work to build language bridges. In February 2024 the Town implemented a Language Access Plan that will pave a way to better communicate with all its residents.

With 46 percent of Morrisville residents being Asian and roughly 36 percent of the total population being Asian-Indians, the Town is fully committed to adopting language access goals as an essential step in the journey to fostering a more inclusive environment through effective communication with the entire community.

The Language Access Plan, which includes translating vital documents into residents' native languages, serves as an action-oriented implementation plan to ensure compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This act prohibits recipients of federal financial assistance from discriminating because of race, color, or national origin in the provision of any program or activity.

Providing language access in Morrisville is more than a federal mandate. It is important to the Town because the leadership is committed to inclusivity and to building stronger community connections in as many ways as possible.

Last year the Town was one of nine North Carolina communities accepted by UNC-Chapel Hill's Institute for the Study of the Americas to participate in the Local Government Language Access Collaborative. Morrisville's language access team consisted of five Morrisville employees and two members from the community partner agency, Hindi Vikas Mandal (HVM) Hindi Pathshala, which functions as a part of the Hindu Society of North Carolina (HSNC). Together the group discussed inclusive practices and policies related to language access, conducted assessments, learned from immigrant leaders and language access practitioners, and created the Language Access Plan to expand communication with residents in community languages.

The Town was awarded a \$25,000 grant through the program to initiate the plan.

"We realized that we had a need in our community to increase the access to services," said Deputy Town Manager Giselle Rodriguez-Villanueva. "Our Language Access Plan will guide our efforts to better communicate with all of our residents."

The goals of the Language Access Plan include:

- Increasing the understanding and awareness of other cultures and language access inclusivity
- Development of a brand to allow residents to identify with the LAP
- Creation of accessible programs and information resources that embrace a diverse, inclusive community
- Improving resources that aid critical emergency situations

• Development of key resources and professional development of staff that improve language access to information and services

Public Works Beautification

This fiscal year (July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024) improvements and beautifications at the Morrisville Aquatic & Fitness Center (MAFC) were a main focus of Public Works. The MAFC building was originally constructed in 1987 and is starting to show its age. Many updates were needed to bring the building up to code for safety and fire protection reasons. MAFC projects completed in 2024 include:

- Modernization of the old elevator
- Beautification of the exterior of the building
- Multicolor LED safety lights
- Festival mat upgrades on the interior
- Electrical upgrades and reworking of office space



Mural Program

The Town of Morrisville now has three new murals! We are thrilled to activate and enhance the cultural connectivity and vitality of the Town through engaging artwork and creative placemaking. Murals have been placed at Shiloh Park, the Fire Administration Building, and the Morrisville Aquatics & Fitness Center. Our featured local artists are profiled below.

Raman Bhardwaj is our muralist for Shiloh Park. Raman is an award-winning artist who was born in India. He spent the early years of his career as a newspaper illustrator before branching out as a fulltime freelance artist. Today, he lives in Greensboro, creating murals, portraits, illustrations, and paintings for a wide range of clients—from national brands like the Charlotte Hornets, to local entities like schools in Greensboro and Hillsborough. He has painted more than 50 murals in North Carolina for various organizations and individuals.

Sampada Kodagali Agarwal is our muralist for the Morrisville Aquatics & Fitness Center. She is a dedicated visual artist, who has spent more than 18 years exploring traditional folk and tribal arts from India, along with focusing on an abstract, meditative art method called Zentangle®. Sampada calls Morrisville home and works as an IT professional in Cary. She loves to explore opportunities where art becomes the language that bridges barriers and spills over into everyday life. As an artist, using her talent to promote little known tribal art forms and giving back to the community is her focus. Painting murals is her passion since it inherently compels people to connect, engage, and share.

Max Dowdle is our muralist for the Fire Administration Building. He is a seventh-generation North Carolinian growing up in a family of artists and craftspeople and was exposed to creativity from an early age. Max is passionate about creative placemaking, which involves using art and design to revitalize public spaces and create more vibrant and inclusive communities. He believes that public art has the power to transform ordinary spaces into something extraordinary, to spark conversation and encourage reflection, and to bring people together in new and unexpected ways.




Morrisville Central App Upgrades
