Morrisville Approves Town Center Development Agreement

Since as early as 2007, Morrisville's town council has formally envisioned the Town Center project that will bring a downtown and a destination hub to Morrisville. Since 2020, the Town has been working through a public-private partnership with Singh Development, LLC on a development agreement that outlines the intended public and private development for the first phase of the Town Center project, the responsibilities of both partners, and the funding required for the public investment. The Town, Singh, and the Development Finance Initiative at the UNC School of Government have worked collaboratively on this project.

The North Carolina Local Government Commission approved the proposed development agreement between the Town and Singh on September 10, 2024; this approval is required because the Town is using bond funds to support the Town Center project. At its September 10 council meeting, the town council voted to approve the development agreement and a capital project ordinance amendment to fund \$19 million for the Town's public investment in Phase 1A of the Town Center project.

Town Center (continued)

Over the course of the past four years, the Town and Singh have come to agreement on an initial memorandum of understanding to collaborate on the project, a pre-development agreement to identify and fund portions of the project that needed to occur prior to the formal development agreement, and have collaborated on the rezoning of the Phase IA properties for the Main Street planned development zoning district to ensure the intended look and feel of the Town Center is realized. The Town also held several community meetings and outreach efforts seeking feedback on the design and amenities for the Town Center.

This public investment supports the infrastructure necessary for the project as well as the Town Green (which will include a performance stage, water feature, and children's play area), additional event space through the extension of Foxglove Drive from Carolina Street to Town Hall Drive, an improved space for the Western Wake Farmers Market and Education Garden, and other amenities. Singh will construct cottage retail units in the Town Green and will have additional retail and commercial space on Carolina Street.

The approval of the development agreement formalizes the commitment of the Town and Singh to move forward to construction of Phase 1A of the project. The next steps will include a site plan submittal by Singh Development and an anticipated groundbreaking in spring 2025. Additionally, the Town will continue its outreach to the community and particularly the surrounding neighborhoods to share design and amenities and to create a destination that will proudly represent Morrisville. A Look Back as We Push Forward, Sustainably

Fiscal Year 2024 saw tremendous growth and advancement of the Master Sustainability Plan* goals, strategies, and actions including the development of sustainable purchasing guidelines, the addition of four new EV charging stations, and an internal goal to not use Town funds to purchase bottled single use plastic water.

It can be a challenge for a Town that continues to grow—often expanding services and amenities—to reduce the usage of fuels like electricity and gasoline. But reducing fossil fuels is a key element of sustainability because they contribute to human-induced or anthropogenic climate change when burned.

The Town continues to build new facilities with an eye toward green building practices that support the inclusion of ultra-efficient mechanical systems, material waste diversion from construction projects, renewable energy options, and environmental considerations such as native plant material usage. Additional items such as water bottle filling stations for events, expanding EV charger access, and pro-pollinator efforts like adding apiaries (or beehives) to Fire Station No. 3, further add to our overall sustainability portfolio.

The Sustainability program provided an administrative report to the town council on September 24 that outlined the status of the goals, programmatic achievements, and initiatives that occurred outside of the timeline that support and strengthen the Town's overall commitment to sustainability.

This past year was witness to innovation, creativity, and unwavering enthusiasm by management, staff, and volunteers alike, as we continue to strive to make Morrisville a more sustainable community.
